GOOD NEWS FOR IT HIRING!

- A study released Friday by the National University System Institute for Policy Research shows that the local tech industry — a diverse field that includes clean-tech companies, telecommunications firms, biotechnology labs, software developers and government contractors — has fared relatively well during the recession. Although tech companies were not immune to the downturn, with employment dropping 3 percent over the past 21 months, that compares with a 9 percent decline overall, the institute found. The work forces in most tech sectors have been relatively stable since last fall, positioning the industry to be a driver of the economy as the recovery continues.
- Just 10 days ago, Beacon Economics, a research firm in Los Angeles, forecast that San Diego County “will see faster growth than its neighbors owing to its concentration in the high-tech and biotech industries.”
- The Monster Employment Index, which monitors online job postings nationwide, showed that want ads for computer and mathematical workers in San Diego County have risen more than 25 percent since hitting a low point in May. Some of the hottest areas for employment are in software engineering, creating applications for mobile phones and social media, and developing online sales and marketing tools targeting consumers as well as businesses.
